Barnet Bulldogs came and offered a taster session and 12 children then regularly attended a Monday after school club at Christ College. Motor skills intervention took place for 3 hours per week with 12 children. Children improved and were able to take part more readily in PE lessons. Every Year 3 child received Bikeability training, totaling 8 hours. All children in years 5-6 took part in trials for the sportshall athletics. New after school clubs introduced (basketball with 18 regular attendees and dance with drama (27 regular attendees). Basketball has proven successful with the team finishing second in the Barnet tournament. Skipping was introduced as a one-off event with every child taking part. This has been added as a regular playtime activity. Skipping workshops were offered to 100% of children (see Key indicator 2).
